Dear Community Members,

Well, your exhausted Chaplain has returned. I didn't have much internet access in Rome. Well, actually, I did, but since it was my vacation, I only used it occasionally, mostly to clean out an inbox that would be bursting with unimportant stuff (ebay, spam, people from the Nigeria who want to give me millions) I didn't want to deal with upon my return. Anyway, while in Rome, I wrote a rather thought-filled email to many folks. Some of you might have received it. Perhaps I'll use it or parts of it for next week's letter. But, for now, a bit of a recap.

First, since walking is pretty much a way of life in Rome, one has to look forward to sore feet, knees, legs and being both exhilarated and tired at the end of the day. Still, all of that is part of Roman life, for tourists anyway. The cobblestones are difficult at best, the streets are crowded, public transportation is a study in mob movement. Still Rome is worth enduring any discomfort – even 10 lifetimes' worth.

Like any city, Rome has its advantages and drawbacks. If one likes big cities, Rome, though maintaining its special characteristics, is much the same as New York, Paris, Athens or Columbo (Sri Lanka). I can attest to

that by personal experience. If one dislikes (or thinks he dislikes) big cities, then Rome should be regarded as an incredible adventure, a once in a lifetime possibility. The colorful city wallpaper includes beggars, street musicians, people of every color and race. It's a city full of linguistic music. I heard no fewer than 10 different languages. And the food! I'll tell you a truism: It's really hard to get a bad meal in Rome!

Briefly, I began and ended by celebrating Mass in St. Peter's Basilica. The first was at the altar of Blessed Innocent XI, the last, at the altar of Pope St. Leo the Great! I stayed at the North American College, very close to the Vatican. I saw the Holy Father twice at Sunday Angelus and once at the Wednesday Audience. I also had a private audience (with my friend, Monsignor Schaedel) with Cardinal Burke!

I'm already at the end of this letter, due to space, so next time, I'll tell you about the other churches I visited and where I said Mass. I'm glad to be home with you, my children and my friends.
