Dear Community Members,

I write to you the day after The Feast of the Epiphany. I wanted to get this letter done before taking off for Philadelphia. Once again, I wish you all a Blessed Christmas and New Year. Our Lord was expected and we prepared for him during the season of Advent. He came, as promised, born of the Virgin Mary in His human nature at Christmas. He was revealed to His own that very day and yesterday, He revealed Himself to the gentiles. The One Who is to save mankind revealed Himself to the whole of mankind. What a revelation!

After this coming weekend, the liturgical calendar returns to run its customary course. Outside of two Sundays on which Feasts of the Lord fell, and a few, very major saints, the calendar listed only ferias of Christmas and ferias of Epiphany. Yet, the Feast of The Epiphany pointed to two additional landmark events in Our Lord's life, namely those additional Self-revelation events which "launched" His earthly ministry. Those events, one a feast in its own right, the other commemorated on the Second Sunday after The Epiphany, are, respectively, Our Lord's Baptism and The Wedding Feast at Cana, where, as St. John tells us, Christ performed his first "sign."

The first feast I mentioned, the Baptism of the Lord, is next Tuesday, 13 January. During that week, we also have, to name two, the feasts of St. Hilary and St. Paul, the first hermit on 14 and 15 January respectively. These are two very important saints and left a very definite mark on the early Church. St. Hilary, as described by St. Jerome, was "a man of mighty eloquence, the Latin trumpet against the Arians". He was Bishop of Poitiers, died in AD 368 and was declared a Doctor of the Church in 1831. St. Paul is known as the first hermit, a man of great sanctity, who lived in the Egyptian desert until his death in AD 342, according to St. Jerome, at the age of 113. It's when we reflect upon the lives of two such men that we might look back and wonder what we've accomplished in the years God has given us on this earth. Perhaps this will serve us all, especially me as your chaplain, as food for thought in AD 2015, my children and my friends.
