Dear Community Members,

This Sunday is known as Passion Sunday. It begins the two week period known as “Passiontide.” Technically, this Sunday is liturgically identified as the First Sunday of the Passion. Palm Sunday, likewise, has the name Second Sunday of the Passion or Palm Sunday, *Dominica II Passionis seu in Palmis*. You will notice that all the statues and the crucifixes are veiled in purple.

The veiling is, technically, to take place following *Nones* of Saturday (before Passion Sunday). The scriptural reason is the last line of the Gospel for this Sunday which says, “But Jesus hid Himself and went out of the temple.” This was in order to avoid being stoned by the Jews and to preserve His Life until it was time for Him to give It up on the cross. When the Lord hides Himself, it is only all the more fitting for His saints to hide themselves as well. Hence the veiling of all statues and images.

Here and there, you’ll find statues veiled in churches where the Traditional Latin Mass is NOT celebrated at all. When asked why, the faithful parishioner of such a church might say, “well, it’s been our tradition; we’ve always done it.” I’m sure that’s true, but the ironic thing is that in no Gospel for this Sunday in the Ordinary Form – and remember there is a three year lectionary cycle – is the Gospel we have on this day. So, it’s actually kind of odd that statues be veiled in any church where the Traditional Mass is not said. Don’t get me wrong, it’s nice that the tradition is observed, but if there is no liturgical reason for doing so, then it’s a tradition without foundation. “We’ve always done it this way” isn’t really a good reason for doing something. Now, this is not to say that those devoted to the Ordinary Form are the only ones who do this. Sometimes, even we follow this line of thinking.

This coming Friday, i.e., 27 March, will be the last time we will formally follow the Way of the Cross. If you haven’t yet availed yourself of this means of grace, you’ll have one last chance.

This past Thursday, we celebrated St. Joseph’s Day. This coming week, we will celebrate The Annunciation, a first class feast, with Low Mass at 7:15 AM and Sung Mass at 7:00 PM. Another wonderful source of Lenten Graces, my children and my friends.
