Dear Community Members,

This present bulletin is being completed and will be sent to the website Wednesday, 13 January, the Commemoration of the Baptism of the Lord. This feast serves as the terminal “bookend” to what was formerly known as the Octave of the Epiphany. Technically, the Epiphany no longer has an octave even though it is a feast of the first class and is of cataclysmic importance. After all, it was Our Lord’s revelation of Himself to the gentiles.

There is a strong liturgical link connecting three distinct events in the life of our Lord. These events are connected because they are all “revelatory” in themselves. These three events follow upon one another every year at this time. Those three events are: The Epiphany, The Baptism of the Lord and the Wedding Feast at Cana. We have already celebrated the first two and the third and last happens Sunday, 17 January. In the Epiphany, Christ reveals Himself to the gentiles, i.e., the non-Jewish world. At His Baptism by St. John the Baptist, our Patron, He reveals his Divinity to John. And with His first miracle, the changing of water into wine at Cana, He makes it clear to the apostles who He really is. The gospel tells us, in no uncertain terms, that, due to this *sign*, “His disciples believed in Him.”

Liturgically, these three events are linked, i.e., explicitly specified, in the Vespers antiphon for the Magnificat on the Epiphany and the Baptism. The 2nd Sunday after Epiphany has its own Magnificat antiphon, but, still, due to the miracle’s mention on the other feast days, the link is still there.

Speaking of the only Epiphany Sunday we’ll celebrate this year, I hope that enough of you will remember to bring wine to church. I’ll make it a point to bless the wine you bring after the sermon.

Gosh, it’s quite unusual for the post Epiphany season to be so short. But, as we well know, everything depends on the date of Easter. This year, Easter falls on 27 March. This means that the Annunciation is transferred. We will celebrate it Monday, 4 April. St. Joseph just squeaks by this year, his feast falling on Saturday, 19 March, the day before Palm Sunday.

Start gathering your candles together – or start buying them now. It won’t be long till 2 February, the feast of Candlemas. Wow, Christmas came in a whirlwind and now I’m already thinking about Holy Week and Easter. Better slow down and catch my breath, my children and my friends.
