Dear Community Members,

A Happy, belated 4th of July to all of you. I hope your holiday was pleasant and enjoyable. Things were pretty much “same old, same old” around the rectory. No, it’s not as boring as it sounds. I’ve grown accustomed to routine. It’s comfortable. Yes, sad, I know. But there is something now that gets my blood moving a bit more quickly – looking forward to my vacation. As I write this, it’s only a bit over five more weeks.

I’ve contacted my friend, Father Stéphane Dupré, in Sarasota. Christ the King is our chapel down there. I asked him if he needed any help, figuring I could celebrate a Sunday Mass or two. He’s set and doesn’t need my help, which is OK, since priests have to jump through a myriad of hoops down there just to celebrate Mass and preach.
