Dear Community Members,

My thanks to Father Orłowski for taking over the bulletin letter last week. What a week that was, I tell you.

First of all, you know I was nowhere to be seen last Sunday, 16 October. That entire weekend was taken up with the annual meeting of the Equestrian Order of the Knights of the Holy Sepulchre of Jerusalem. Saturday, I went to the “promotion Mass” where many knights and ladies were promoted to a higher rank. Last Sunday was taken up with a meeting, lunch and “Investiture Mass” where new knights and ladies were invested with their regalia. This was most impressive, believe me. The only sad thing is that there’s no church in Little Rock that could accommodate so many people. So, we had all of the ceremonies in the State House Convention Center. The highlight for us was our own Tom Pyron being invested as a Knight in his new regalia. The dinner following was quite nice too.

The Knights of the Holy Sepulchre is a particular order of papal knighthood. It is also an organization where, unlike the Knights of Columbus, women can become members in their own right. They do not have to be married to a knight to become a “lady.”

The vesture is quite imposing. Men wear either a tuxedo or tails over which is a rather large white cape with a large, red Cross of Jerusalem emblazoned on the left side and with a white velvet collar. A knight also wears a rather large, black beret as well. Depending on the occasion, he also wears his insignia, i.e., either a cross medallion of various sizes, depending on his rank or a medal with ribbon. Ladies wear a black dress, either street length or long, again, depending on the occasion, a black chapel veil and her own unique jewelry insignia.

Priests, in “the old days” were invested with the white mozetta and insignia. In these days of concelebration, however, a priest receives a “Jerusalem” stole which he wears at Mass. Guess which one I had? Yep, the mozetta, since I don’t concelebrate.

The very next day, I drove to Nebraska for the annual fall meeting of the FSSP priests. It was a most daunting trip – 10 hours each way. But, it was good to see the brethren. This year, a former parishioner of mine, a psychologist, gave a very good presentation on priestly life and human formation.

Yes, I was here last Sunday; your eyes didn’t fool you. Father Orłowski is back for good, come Tuesday, 25 October. I, however, will be away again until Monday, 31 October for a Baptism in Indianapolis and a very special Mass at the parish of my former pastor. Yes, a Latin Mass, my children and my friends.
