Dear Community Members,

Some or even many of you may not have noticed some of things that have been going on in the parish. If you come to Mass in time to make a preparation beforehand, you may have caught the end of the recitation of the Rosary. Hopefully we now have the right formula in place that so the Rosary can be recited in a more devout manner befitting the dignity and love which a parish can display for Our Lady. Our choir and schola choir continue to work and develop. Efforts are being made by the serving core, by both the sung and “low Mass” contingent, and things are improving. The handmaids of the altar continue to work as well. This week I will be finalizing plans for a scheduling tool to help St. Patrick parish and us here coordinate with each other and keep the parish better informed of event that are taking place.

I have to thank Father Magiera for his kind words in last week’s bulletin and for graciously receiving me here. I made an absolutely hilarious mistake the other day and I could not figure out what went wrong. I was comfortable with asking Father Magiera for help early on. If I did not think that we could work together, I would have had to agonize over the problem myself. After he did a lot of investigation on the problem assuming that someone else had made an error, we discovered that there was not any problem at all. I had made the error and thought there was a problem that was not really there. He excused the trouble that I caused with the virtue that he has already demonstrated. I have to say I had been slightly nervous about sharing common life with him. I knew that he was very organized and this sometimes means that a person is obsessive-compulsive. Such a person tends to be impatient and rash. Fr. Magiera however has been certainly very understanding and patient with me. It means we have been able to cooperate on a lot more things, manage issues that come up better and I am able to be more productive and serve the parish better.

When I entered the FSSP seminary years ago I had apprehensions as well. Given the way some of the laity in the church talk, I imagined that a seminarian could be somewhat “embattled” in the FSSP. I thought that, perhaps, seminarians would demand to know various positions from one another on problems in the Church (both perceived and real), and be scrutinized and, possibly, even persecuted. Would I have to reveal and suffer for opinions about which I did not much care? Blessed be God, when I got to the seminary I was surprised and relieved by the charity shown and the brotherhood that we immediately shared. It was helped by the fact that we were moving into the as yet unfinished building in Denton and so we all had to suffer the same inconveniences – and they were legion – before the building was finished. I remember that, in the first semester no seminarian left, and it was only after the accommodations became more amenable that seminarians started to leave, as is more the case with the discernment process. I was therefore very much encouraged by my initial impression of the FSSP seminary life.

I have to say that I have been encouraged by my initial impressions of this parish with Father Magiera and all the parishioners: your involvement, your good natured courtesy and hospitality. I look forward to often witnessing good things coming from you all and all of us being encouraged and further edified.
