Dear Community Members,

I was tickled by something I read the other day about one of the differences between the north and the south. The quote was something like, “well, ya never hear about a southerner retiring up north!” That’s very true, I guess. And, of course we hear about northern “snow birds” who, without fail, providing they have the financial ability, flee the north around October and don’t even think about returning till March or so.

Well, I’ve been here three years now. True, it’s not as bad as I thought it was back in 2013, when I could barely walk from my front door to my car. But sometimes, I still find myself saying in my best Brooklynese, “enuff wit’ da heat areddy!”

Well, it certainly has been a dreadful stretch recently in many ways. So much violence and death. So many lives snuffed out or shattered; so many families ripped apart; so much spiritual devastation. Both of those days marked a kind of separation and involved revolutions. We like to think of ours as superior to that of the French. It was, to a point. Alas, the French sought to separate from God. Never a good idea.

So much blood spilled then. So much blood being spilled now – in this month of all months, the Month of the Most Precious Blood. Why do we not learn? Why do we not realize that Our Lord, in pouring out His Precious Blood for us, negates any reason for us to go about spilling more.

On a lighter note, I just had the good fortune to have a new Arkansas experience. I was invited to travel to Eureka Springs for dinner and an opera performance. I’d heard quite a bit about Eureka Springs – yes how “liberal” it is but also how “artsy” and charming it is. It was nice to see and hear an opera again. It’s been too long. It was a double bill of *Il Tabarro* and *I Pagliacci*. Very exciting. In the latter, not only the soprano dies, but also the baritone. In the former, it’s only the tenor. Such is the world of opera, my children and my friends.
